DIOCESAN COUNCIL

The Diocesan Council of the Episcopal Diocese of Western Louisiana meets on a quarterly basis on the second Tuesday of that month, unless there is not enough business to warrant a meeting. The Council has met three times since the 40th Annual Convention of the Diocese on March 9, 2019. The Council reviews the financial status of the diocese and prepares the annual budget to present at Diocesan Convention. The annual budget is approved by the Diocesan Council following the Convention. A verbal report from each of the Council departments and a report on the activities of various ministries of the diocese are given at every meeting. Representatives from each of the five convocations update the Council on activities taking place in their convocation.

During the 2019 – 2020 Term, the Diocesan Council acted on the following matters:

- I. For the Annual Diocesan Giving, the Council approved the Finance Committee's movement to assess 10% of the current year's income as reflected in the annual budget of parishes and missions. Failure to comply will result in loss of vote at Convention.
- 2. At the request of Daniel Chapman, Director of Hardtner Camp and Conference Center, the Council approved a change in the Bylaws to extend membership to the Diocese of Louisiana.
- 3. The Council approved a movement from the Finance Committee to allow the Treasurer and Treasurer-elect to adjust staff salaries as needed.
- 4. The Provisional Budget was approved to be presented to the 2020 Diocesan Convention.
- 5. The sale of the donated unattached property belonging to Trinity, Natchitoches, was authorized.
- 6. Canon Gray Easterling, Diocesan Treasurer, and Nancy Shaw, Secretary of Convention, are retiring.

ECUMENICAL REPORT

Purpose: The Ecumenical Officers Fr. Wayne Carter and Madre Annie Etheredge serve as representatives of the Bishop and the Diocese in Ecumenical Dialogues and events at the local level through the Louisiana Interchurch Conference (LIC) of which we are members and at the national level through participation in the Episcopal Diocesan Ecumenical and Interreligious Officers (EDEIO) and the National Workshop on Christian Unity (NWCU). Fr. Carter is a member of the EDEIO Executive Committee. Both Fr. Carter and Madre Etheredge serve on the Board of Directors and the Executive Committee of the LIC and as members of the EDEIO. Fr. Carter and Madre Etheredge are regional coordinators for the LIC.

A breakfast for clergy in the Alexandria area was held for the celebration of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity (WPCU) was held on January 22, 2020 at Our Lady of Prompt Succor Catholic Church and hosted by Fr. Dan O'Conner of the Catholic Diocese of Alexandria. Representatives from several denominations participated. In central Louisiana the Episcopal and Roman dioceses ALTERNATE every other year for hosting events for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. The odd years are held by the Episcopalians and the even years are hosted by the Roman Catholic Diocese.

EPISCOPAL SCHOOL OF ACADIANA (ESA)

The Episcopal School of Acadiana celebrates its 40th year as the Diocesan School for the Episcopal Diocese of Western Louisiana. ESA opened the 2019-20 school year with 612 students. Fifty seniors will graduate in May 2020, and begin their college journey. The school's mission of academic excellence, honor education, and spiritual growth attracts families from seven different parishes in the region, while the engaging program and a strong sense of community successfully retain both students and faculty.

On Saturday, June I, we closed the 2018-2019 academic year, with the celebration of ESA's thirty-seventh commencement as forty seniors received their diplomas under the oaks on the Cade campus. ESA seniors continue to attract the attention of colleges and universities across the nation. The seniors in the Class of 2019 submitted 220 applications for admission and were admitted to 82 different colleges, universities, and programs. Thirty-six members of the class (90%) were offered merit aid totaling just over \$6.9 million. The graduates are attending 26 different programs this fall including Academy of Interactive Entertainment, Baylor University, Centenary College of Louisiana, Elon University, Hanover College, Louisiana State University, Northwestern University, Oglethorpe University, Princeton University, Rhodes Colleges, Sarah Lawrence College, Sewanee: The University of the South, St. Edward's University, Trinity University, Tufts University of Alabama, University of Louisiana – Lafayette, University of Mississippi, West Virginia University, and Wiley College.

Three members of the Class of 2019 were recognized by the National Merit Scholarship program for exceptional performance on the on the PSAT administered in October 2017. Two were National Merit Commended Students and one named National Merit Scholar. One of these students was also recognized as a National Hispanic Scholar.

Four members of the Class of 2019 were also the first to be inducted to ESA's chapter of The Cum Laude Society. Founded in 1906 and modeled after Phi Beta Kappa, the Cum Laude Society is dedicated to honoring scholastic excellence in secondary schools. ESA is only one of four schools in the state of Louisiana to be granted a charter for demonstrating consistent academic excellence, exceptional college placement, and outstanding performance on national standardized exams.

EPISCOPAL SCHOOL OF ACADIANA (ESA) CONTINUED

ESA students continue to lead in Acadiana and are among the top in the state on standardized test performance. With a senior class median ACT composite score of 27, ESA ranks well above local, state, and national averages. This past May, 88 upper school students took 174 Advanced Placement Exams in 13 different subjects with 82% of the students scoring 3 or higher on at least one AP exam. The College Board recognized 16 of these students as AP Scholars, 7 as AP Scholars with Honors, 7 as AP Scholars with Distinction, and 4 as National AP Scholars.

ESA students excelled in athletics as well. The Falcons captured two state championships in the 2018-2019 school year (boys Cross-Country and girls Track and Field), bringing our total to 85 State Championships! ESA was State Runner-up in girls cross country, girls' Soccer and boys Golf. Six 2019 ESA graduates will participate in their sports at the college level this year.

The Performing and Visual Art Departments continue to flourish. In theatre, students performed a series of sketches revolving around Elvis Presley in advance of the spring musical, Bye Bye Birdie. The Lower School musical, Aladdin, was a huge success. The music program performed the entire album of Thriller during Spooktacular, a three-day Halloween themed volleyball tournament. Advanced musicians traveled to Dallas and performed at the ISAS Fine Arts Festival. We showcased a jazz band performance, a rock performance and an acoustic coffee house stage. Our spring concert was part of the 2019 Festival International festivities. The kids performed over 3 hours of music and they brought the house down! Throughout the year, the ESA musicians performed in coffee house, for Eucharist and in music chapels.

The Visual Arts Department participated in a variety of exhibitions in 2019. The lower school's art students exhibited a wide range of 2D and 3D media and techniques throughout the school year in their Enrichment Center. Fifth grade students worked on a legacy project creating a permanent logo and signage for the new lower school IDEA Lab. ESA's upper school students participated in ULL's district rally, receiving first places in painting, photography, and sculpture, and third place in sculpture. ESA's Annual Senior Art Exhibition was held in the Kelli Kaufman Gallery and was on view for the monthly art walk as well as Festival International: works included drawing, painting, photography, flame worked glass and metal-worked jewelry, hand-built ceramics, pottery, 3D mixed media, and video. The ESA Visual Arts faculty were presented certificates of special recognition "for outstanding art program achievement" from the Director of the LSU School of Art and Dean of the College of Art and Design. Students in ExLabs, ESA's video productions program, submitted films to local, national and international festivals and were selected into the New Iberia Film Festival (received Director's Choice Award and Best High School Student Film), the All American High School Film Festival in New York City, Reading Film Festival in Pennsylvania, the Zoom Student Film Festival in Toronto, Ontario, and the Stuffit Film Festival in Australia.

EPISCOPAL SCHOOL OF ACADIANA (ESA) CONTINUED

On our Cade campus, ESA's chapel program and religious studies courses are led by our Chaplain, Dr. Andrew Armond. Dr. Armond teaches several religion courses at ESA, including a required, academically rigorous "Introduction to Religion" class for 8th graders. The course approaches religious education from a comparative religions standpoint, focusing not only on "who believes what," but on the complexities of the historical, social, and geographical interactions that fuel religious ideas and practices. This semester-long course gives Dr. Armond the opportunity to present extended units on Judaism and Christianity that focus on how to read the sacred stories of the Bible and how to interpret the narrative arc of God's covenant with God's people.

Dr. Armond also teaches several upper-school courses that enable more advanced studies of theology and literature. He offers an upper-school course that uses film, literature, and other media to help students understand contemporary geopolitical and social issues through a religious lens. He also teaches an elective on Dante's Divine Comedy for the upper school that introduces students to the ecclesiastical, historical, and theological foundations of Western Christianity.

Dr. Armond is also now the Rev. Deacon Armond, having been ordained to the transitional diaconate last December. His ordination has provided the opportunity for further conversations with students and faculty about the life of faith in the Episcopal Way. In addition, Dr. Armond is stressing ESA's motto, "excellence from within," in ensuring that chapels are educational, meaningful, and professional programs that bring students, faculty, and administrators together to celebrate the life of the school. The Cade campus Chapel service incorporates an abbreviated form of Morning Prayer, as well as time for intentional prayer and meditation. This Lent, Dr. Armond will conduct a Bible study on campus, and students have expressed interest in a Student Ministry Team that will help oversee educational and spiritual development on campus.

Dr. John Campbell's departure from the Lower School for Seminary of the Southwest has left it without a chaplain at present. The chapel program is continuing to be led by capable faculty members, and Dr. Armond and others provide pastoral support in times of crisis.

Eucharist services at both campuses are being celebrated by Fr. Matt Woollett of the Episcopal Church of the Epiphany in New Iberia and Fr. Michael Bordelon and Fr. Brooks Boylan of St. Barnabas in Lafayette.

EPISCOPAL SCHOOL OF ACADIANA (ESA) CONTINUED

The 2018-2019 Annual Fund campaign was a success, raising more than \$324,000, with 72% parent giving, 100% Trustee and faculty giving, and support from past parents, alumni, grandparents, former faculty and friends. The ESA Falcon Club, ESA's Booster Club for Athletics and the Arts, raised funds through memberships and a dinner, and provided a variety of equipment for arts and athletics at every level, from PK3 to 12th grade. The ESA Parent Group hosted a 40th anniversary celebration that included bingo and a tribute to a recently retired founding faculty member. We continue to appeal to our alumni for support of the Tates/Tutwiler Endowment Fund for financial aid. In 2019-2020, 26% of ESA students will receive financial assistance that is supported by this \$1 million+ endowment. In addition to summer and winter issues of our Oasis magazine, the Communications team has added an annual Gratitude Report that includes a roll of donors and stories about class projects, extracurricular programs, professional development, facility improvements, and other benefits made possible by generous donations to ESA.

I am blessed to work in a school that lives out its mission of scholarship, honor and service to others.

YOUTH AND YOUNG ADULT MINISTRY

Since last convention, diocesan youth and young adult ministry has been doing many new and old things, and evaluating at each turn how and where these ministries will continue to go.

Last March at our annual high school retreat, CLEY, a dozen young adult leaders planned and led a god-focused and fun-filled weekend for 20 youth from across the state. We learned about the Gospel according to Napoleon Dynamite, played games, worshiped and lived in Christian community. Later that spring, we initiated our first planning team for a potential young adult retreat.

In the Fall, we had a very successful and spirit led middle school retreat: JEYL. With 40 middle school participants, high school staff, and young adult leaders, we learned about the seven parts of living a life that follows Jesus by "Walking in the Way of Love."

In January, our annual Happening retreat was canceled because of low registration numbers. While disappointing, we took this as an opportunity! The Happening staff gathered with the Diocesan Youth Commission and other community stakeholders for a Youth Visioning Weekend, where we talked about "why" we do diocesan youth ministry, did lots of brainstorming, and cast our eyes on the future of Diocesan youth ministry both in 2020 and beyond!

Over the course of these events, we served more than 60 youth & young adults from across the entire state. We are continuing to dream, learn, and partner in new ways with those within our diocese, across the state, and in the denominational church, and look forward to what is to come!
